**Requirements:** There will be three take-home exams and five short response papers. For grading, they will combine in this way:

30% Exam #3

10% response papers

**Exams:** Each exam will be handed out at the class meeting prior to the one at which it is due. Answers should be typed.

**Reading response papers:** Students will be responsible for writing five reading response papers during the term. Each should be about one typed page, extracting the central thesis of the reading. It should explain the main thing that the author is trying to claim and their main argument for it. It should *not* mention everything from the reading, but should instead identify the key issue.

These may be written for any five readings, but must be turned in *before* we have discussed the readings in class.

Class participation: Participation in class discussion is required. Exemplary participation will add to your grade, up to two-thirds of a letter grade.

Academic honesty: Cheating will not be tolerated.

**Absences:** Students who will need to miss deadlines for foreseeable reasons should discuss them with the professor at the beginning of the term. If an emergency results in absence, the student should contact the professor as soon as possible.
