Forum discussion: The assigned topic for a forum discussion will be given out by sometime Wednesday evening, at the latest. You are expected to make your initial post addressing the topic by class-time the following Monday. You should also respond to your classmates' posts. The expectation is that you will write at least two responses. Although you can get credit for writing your post and two responses one right after the other, it makes for a better discussion if you come back at a later time to see if anyone has responded to what you wrote. You'll get more credit if some of your responses are made later. Any responses made by the end of day Friday will count toward your grade. There will not be new forum assignments in Weeks 8, 15, or 16.

Class participation: Participation in class discussion is required. Exemplary participation will add to your grade, up to two-thirds of a letter grade.

Academic honesty: Forum posts should be your own writing, although you are encouraged to discuss ideas with anyone who will listen. Exam answers are your own work. Cheating will not be tolerated.
